

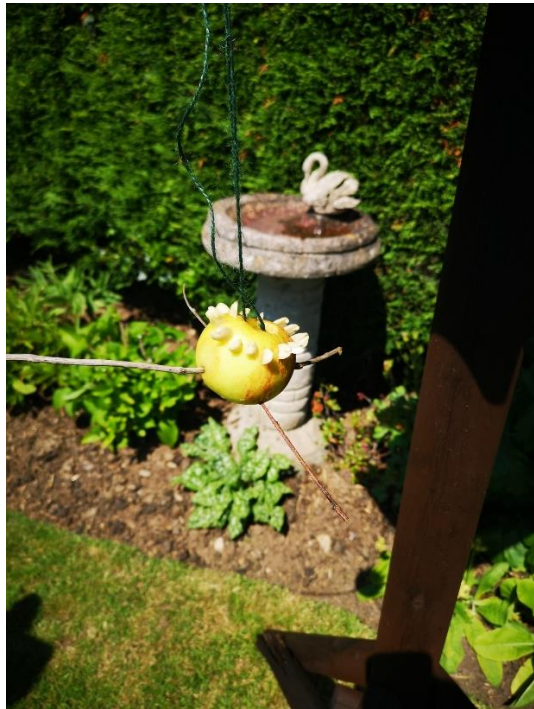

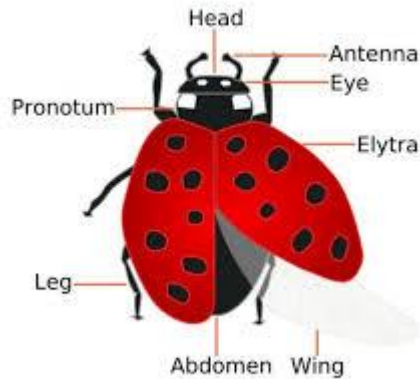

Ladybirds



Most ladybirds have oval, dome-shaped bodies with six short legs. Depending on the species, they can have spots, stripes or no markings at all. Seven-spotted ladybirds are red (or sometimes orange) with three spots on each side and one in the middle. Their head is black with white patches on either side.

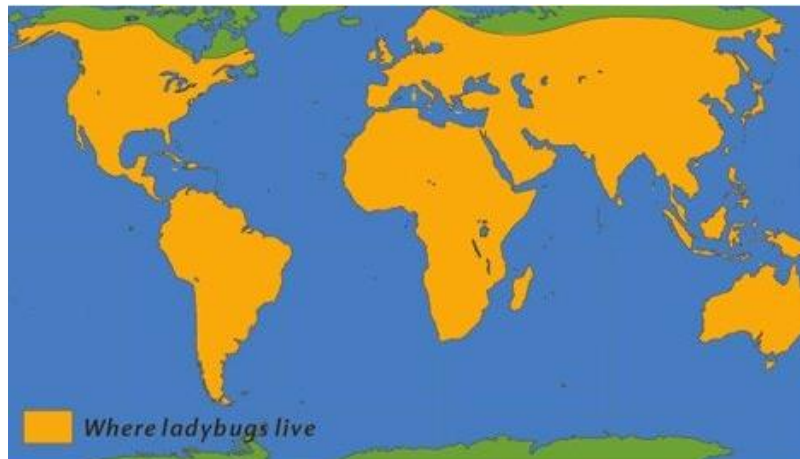
Quick Facts

- **Scientific name:** Coccinellidae septempunctata (seven-pot ladybird)
Family name: Coccinellidae
- Technically, they're lady beetles, not bugs
- They aren't all red with black spots
- A ladybird may consume 5,000 aphids in its life
- Winter is the time for a 'ladybirds bacchanalia' (and Hibernation)
- A ladybirds spots warn potential predators

What they eat

Most ladybirds voraciously consume plant-eating insects, such as aphids, and in doing so they help to protect crops. ladybirds lay hundreds of eggs in the colonies of aphids and other plant-eating pests. When they hatch, the ladybird's larvae immediately begin to feed.

Where they live



Ladybirds live everywhere

Ladybirds mainly live in shrubs, trees, fields, gardens and sometimes in homes. They often lay their eggs near a colony of aphids, as that is their main source of food. Found all over the world, ladybirds flourish in places where their food sources thrive.
