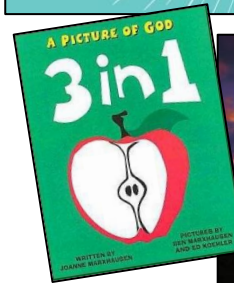


## Subject Specific Vocabulary

Trinity	Christians believe God is Trinity - three in one.
God the Father	Christian believes that God created and sent the Son.
God the Son	Jesus, saves all people from the consequence of sin.
God the Holy Spirit	God's power at work in the world today, helping people to worship God and live how He wants them to.
symbols	It is difficult to explain who God is and so people will use symbols to help.
baptism	Christians are baptised with water in the name of the Trinity as a symbol of joining the Christian family.
The Grace	A prayer that reminds us of the love and mercy given to us by God.

# What is the Trinity?

## What do I already know?

Core components of some the Trinity – God as the father, God as the Son.

## Links to the RE curriculum:

(Taken from UC) Pupils will know that:

Christians believe God is Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The Father creates, he sends the Son who saves his people, and the Holy Spirit Christians believe the Holy Spirit is God's power at work in the world and in their lives today, enabling them to follow Jesus.

The story of Jesus's Baptism (Matthew 3, 11-17) including that Jesus was baptised by John the Baptist that a voice came from above and the dove appeared.

Pupils can describe a Christian Baptism (infant and believer) including the terminology of 'in the name of the father, the son and the Holy Spirit'.

Pupils can use their knowledge and understanding to raise relevant questions in response to their enquiry into the Christian concept of The Trinity.

Pupils are able to discuss the idea of God being three in one. They can explore links between the Baptism of Christ and can make connections to the 'Big Story' of Christianity.
