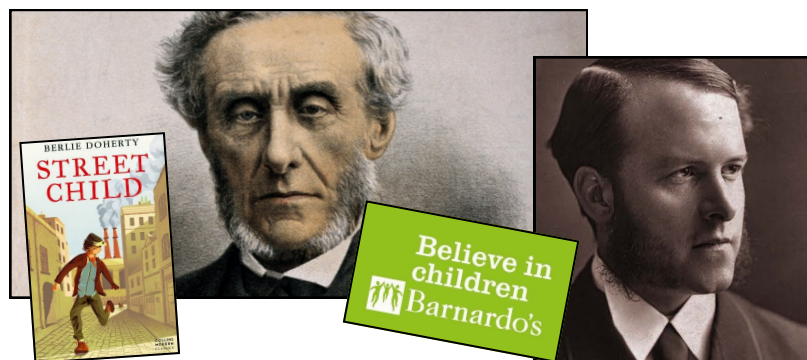


Subject Specific Vocabulary

politician	A person who campaigns to hold a position in government.
reform	To make an improvement by making changes.
working conditions	All of the things that influence someone's working environment.
Victoria era	The time scale that Queen Victoria reigned
orphan	A child whose parents are no longer alive.
orphanage	A home for children whose parents are no longer alive or cannot care for them.
philanthropist	A person that helps other people, especially by giving them money.
mine	A hole or system of holes in the ground where materials such as coal, metal, and salt are removed.
workhouse	A building where very poor people in Britain used to work, in the past, in exchange for food and shelter.
