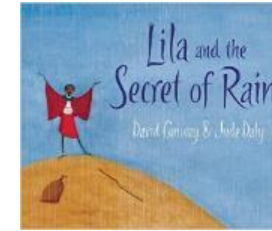
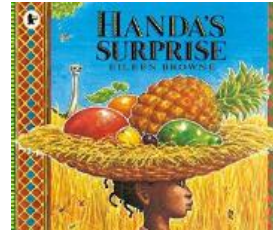


Subject Specific Vocabulary

Europe	a continent in which England is found
Africa	a continent where Kenya is found
wildlife	a group of animals that are wild, do not live with humans, but roam free
climate	aspects of weather over a long time.
Equator	an imaginary line around the centre of the Earth
tropical	a climate where the temperature is hot throughout the year
temperate	a climate where the temperature is not too hot or too cold
drought	a shortage of water due to a lack of rain
savannah	areas of open grassland with dispersed trees
Kenyan	a person or group of people from Kenya
British	a person or group of people from the United Kingdom
export	goods that are traded to other countries

- there are two main languages spoken in Kenya: English and Swahili
- Kenya is situated on the continent of Africa and Bumala'B is in the west of Kenya
- tea and coffee are grown in Kenya and they also produce many flowers due to a tropical climate
- large animals such as lions, buffalo, leopards, elephants and rhinoceros are present in Kenya
- unfortunately, Kenya is still a developing country and more than half the population live in poverty
- Staffordshire is situated in England, the UK and Europe
- meat, crops and dairy are farmed because of climate
- compare British and Kenyan wildlife and habitats
